3	Work within the limits of your knowledge and skills

What we were told

Pre-consultation workshops

- Participants wanted more clarity about appropriate conduct towards service users and colleagues
- Especially balancing professional responsibilities with existing personal relationships



What we were told

Do the revised Standards make it clear what the appropriate boundaries are between a registrant and service users or carers?

- Most respondents (72%) agreed that the proposed changes improved clarity of the standards
- There were 15 positive comments that referred to the improved clarity of the standards.



Our Standards on professional boundaries

Expanded the standards on professional boundaries from one standard to five standards.

Used active language throughout the standards to make registrant responsibility clear

Set out clear definitions for the abuse of service users, carers or colleagues



Your duties as a registrant



Maintain appropriate boundaries: the Standards

- You must consider the potential impact that the position of power and trust you hold as a health and care professional may have on individuals when in social or personal settings.
 - You must take action to set and maintain appropriate professional boundaries with service users and/or carers and colleagues.
 - You must use appropriate methods of communication to provide care and other services related to your practice
 - You must ensure that existing personal relationships do not impact professional decisions.

You must not abuse your position as a health and care practitioner to pursue personal, sexual, emotional or financial relationships with service users and/or carers, or colleagues.



Maintain appropriate boundaries: the Standards

1.11

- You must **CONSIDER** the potential impact that the position of power and trust you hold as a health and care professional may have on individuals when in social or personal settings.
 - You must **take action to** set and maintain appropriate professional boundaries with service users and/or carers and colleagues.
 - You must **use appropriate methods of communication** to provide care and other services related to your practice

You must **ensure** that existing personal relationships do not impact professional decisions.



Maintain appropriate boundaries: clear definitions

Standard 1.12

You must not abuse your position as a health and care practitioner to pursue relationships that are:

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Our work to improve sexual safety


- Upskilled our people
